Lewisburg is in the heart of Coon Range. The city of Lewisburg was founded in 1872 by brothers William and Samuel Henry when a new northsouth railroad route was formed running from Owensboro, Ky. to Russellville, Ky.


It's forerunner city known as Henrysville was located about ½ mile south of what is now Lewisburg, which was formally incorporated in 1878. Located in northwest Logan County, Lewisburg is located on Highway 431 North just 12 miles south of Lake Malone State Park and three miles north of Logan Aluminum Inc., the world's largest aluminum rolling mill.

Although a small community, Lewisburg is home to several small businesses as well as a bank, doctor's office, dentist office, pallet mill and local elementary and middle school.

On Jan. 26, 1995, the Kentucky House of Representatives officially designated Lewisburg as the "Purple Martin Capital of Kentucky" and the first Purple Martin Festival was held on June 1, 1996.

ogan County was formed in 1792, the year that Kentucky became a state.

It borders on Tennessee on the south and originally reached from the Green and Barren rivers on the east to the Mississippi and Ohio on the west.

Twenty-nine counties make up this area today, with Logan the eighth largest in square miles among the 120 in the state. Russellville is the county seat with Adairville, Auburn and Lewisburg other certified cities.

Logan's long and multifaceted history is still evident in the old buildings and beautiful homes that have been preserved. Much of Russellville is included on the National Register of Historic Places. Numerous Kentucky Roadside Historical Markers throughout the county tell of significant sites, events and notable persons.

Once a rugged frontier, Logan County was soon settled with families that cared about a better life. In 1800, the Second Great Awakening, referred to locally as the Great Revival, was centered at Red River Meeting House near Adairville in south Logan. The religious movement spread throughout the southeastern United States. A replica of the log church is always open

and is continually visited by persons from near and far away.

The impact of this religious event led the Society of Shakers to come here and form a settlement in 1807 at South Union, near Auburn. A museum housing furniture, tools and numerous artifacts is open to the public in original Shaker buildings.

Rich soil and suitable climate have traditionally made this an excellent agricultural region. Corn, hay, garden crops, tobacco and livestock are produced. It is one of few locations where double

cropping of winter wheat followed by soybeans can be harvested from the same field in the same growing season.

In the twentieth century when tobacco was the main money crop, Russellville boasted the largest market for one-sucker dark tobacco in the world. Today, Robey Farms is the largest dairy operation in Kentucky. A drive through the country during the months of growing and harvest is an enjoyable experience.

When industry was composed of rope factories, blacksmithing and wagon works, Russellville was listed as the third most important industrial city in Kentucky. The Caldwell Saddle Factory, located on East 4th Street, is believed to be the oldest original factory building still standing in the state.

Logan Aluminum is now the largest employer among a number of modern industries in Logan County. Fifty percent of the aluminum can sheet for all cans made in the United States is produced at the plant in north Logan County.

The Russellville Independent and Logan County school systems owe their good status to a populace that has always valued education, from one-room schools to boarding schools to colleges that offered full degrees.

Reminders still with us are two Rosenwald schools built for African American students —Cedar Grove in the Olmstead community and Schochoh school, which has been relocated to the Logan County High School campus and is furnished with period desks and materials as a museum.

An historical marker at Bethel Shopping Center honors Bethel College for men at its site and a rock monument sits on a cornerstone of Logan College for women on East 7th Street, Both, established before the Civil War, were forced to close during the Great Depression years of the 1930s.

Russellville High School's auditorium is named for Thomas P. deGraffenried, a highly successful lawyer in New York who lived and went to school in Russellville. In 1961, he willed a million dollars to the City of Russellville "for the education of the people therein" in appreciation for the learning opportunities that had been available to him here in his hometown.

The Opera House, built on South Main Street near the Square in 1903, offered traveling shows and concerts as well as local plays and cultural events. Competing athletic teams were and still are plentiful.

Russellville and the other cities in the county each has its own park. Lake Malone State Park is in northern Logan County. The Public Library, 225 Armory Drive, provides a variety of programs, exhibits, materials and services. Logan County Archives, West 4th Street near the Historic Courthouse, houses local records, a destination for genealogists and researchers.

The Chamber of Commerce and the Tourism Commission have printed illustrated walking tour brochures that may be picked up at the Chamber office at 116 South Main Street in Russellville at any time. You are guided through business and residential streets where you see the homes of four Kentucky governors, six churches, the SEEK (Struggle for Emancipation and Equality in Kentucky) Museum, the bank building where the Jesse James gang made its first planned robbery in 1868, Civil War sites, modern shops and offices.

We are proud to welcome you to Logan County.

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

Today's modern bank is a "descendant" of the old Southern Bank of Kentucky. The mural was painted by Burnard Wiley of Madison, Tenn.

Famous Bank Robbery

Built in 1810, the Southern Bank of Kentucky, located on S. Main Street, Russellville, Ky., was robbed by the Jesse James Gang on March 20, 1868 of \$9,000 after they shot and slightly wounded bank president, Nimrod Long.

Jesse James was a bank and train robber in the American Old West, best known as the leading member of the James-Younger gang of outlaws.

There is much recorded about this robbery but one story of irony had its beginning back in the 1840s. Nimrod Long and fellow banker, George W. Norton, had become interested in helping to educate a young Logan County preacher. With their financial aid, they had sent this young man to the Baptist College in Georgetown. In 1868, at the close of the Civil War, the preacher's sons, Jesse and Frank James, had formed a

guerrilla band and robbed the bank of their fathers benefactor, Nimrod Long.

Nimrod Long remained in the building until his death on Nov. 1, 1892. Mrs. Mary A. Long, his widow, deeded to the trustees of Bethel College the building and land which became the college library. Several of the Long heirs lived in the house during the time it was a library.

In 1906, the building became the residence of the family of Judge George Solomon Hardy serving as his office when he was United States Commissioner here.

In the 1940s, the banking room housed the Logan County Library which remained there for about 20 years. Several private owners have lived in the old bank throughout the years. The original safe is still intact.

Red River Meeting House

The Red River Meeting House, located at 3008 Schochoh Rd, Adairville, Ky., was the site of the first religious camp meeting in the United States. Held in June 1800, it marked the start of the Second Great Awakening, a major religious movement in the United States in the first part of the nineteenth century. The meeting was organized by the Presbyterian minister James McGready in Logan County, Ky., and several preachers took part.

What later became known as the Revival of 1800 began as a traditional Presbyterian sacrament service at the Red River Meeting House on the third Sunday of June. As the revival spread to the congregations of McGready's two other area congregations, several hundred people attended the meetings, held from Friday through Tuesday. McGready's other congregations were located at Muddy River and Gasper River. The meeting was a chance for the settlers to end their relative isolation for several days and to engage with new people.

When revival broke out, dozens of members in the congregations had various emotional experiences as the holy spirit moved in the services. When the news spread around the countryside, anticipation for what might happen at the next meeting stirred the curiosity of everyone, and interest soared.

There is a cemetery next to the Red River Meeting House. The



tombstone of one man born in the Highlands of Scotland bears an inscription of the twenty-third psalm written in Gaelic. Generals, colonels, majors, and other soldiers who fought in our country's wars from the beginning are buried there. There is even the grave of one who fought in the battle of Waterloo.

Kentucky Governor John Breathitt

Gov. John Breathitt built and lived in a house located at 145 E. 5th (Bank) Street, Russellville, Ky. (Circa 1812). He lived here with his wife Caroline Matilda Whitaker of Logan County until her death, then with his second wife Susan Mildred Harris of Virginia.

Owned for many years by the Russellville Woman's Club, the building is managed by the Russellville Rotary Club for The Governor Breathitt House, Inc.


A brick building to the west, 119 E. 5th Street, served as the office of Gov. Breathitt, built in 1810 (first only one story).

Breathitt was born in Virginia in 1786 and moved with his father, William, and family to Russellville in 1800 or soon after. Here he learned and practiced surveying, taught school, and read/studied law with Judge Kaleb Wallace. Admitted to the bar in 1810, he developed a successful law practice and a taste for politics.

Breathitt was a Democrat, the only Democrat of Kentucky's first governors. He served in the Kentucky House of Representatives from 1811 to 1815 and was appointed lieutenant governor in 1828 by Republican governor Thomas Metcalfe. Next, he won the governor's race and took office and 1832, serving until his death. Illness with tuberculosis complicated his life and he died at the governor's mansion while still in office in 1834.

Breathitt loved Logan County and had made clear his desire to be buried on the family farm on the north side of Russellville, Ky. The land borders on the present-day bypass. The cemetery, in a clump of trees, is visible from the highway.

Breathitt County in Kentucky was named for Gov. John Breathitt.





Kentucky Governor James Turner Morehead

James Turner Morehead was born in 1797 and raised in Russellville, Ky. His former home resides at 438 S. Main Street, Russellville, Ky.

Armistead Morehead and his wife, Lucy Latham Morehead, moved to Russellville from Bullitt County soon after thier son, James Turner Morehead was born. James grew up on S. Main Street in the atmosphere of community leadership that was exhibited by his father. He studied in the Russellville schools and attended Transylvania University in Lexington, Ky. from 1813 to 1815. He studied law locally in the offices of Judge H. P. Brodnax and John J. Crittenden.

James Turner Morehead moved

to Bowling Green in 1818 and began the practice of law. He married Susan A. Roberts in 1823, and they had two children from 1828 to 1830. He represented Warren County in the Kentucky House of Representatives.

In 1832, James Turner Morehead ran as a National Republican for lieutenant governor and won. Democrat John Breathitt won the race for governor.

When Gov. Breathitt died while in office in 1834, James Turner Morehead was sworn in as governor, serving until 1836.

A noted accomplishment in Gov. James Turner Morehead's tenure was the passage of legislation with his support to map all of Kentucky's rivers and streams.



Gov. James Turner Morehead was the first native-born Kentuckian to hold the office. He did not seek a second term. Morehead died in 1854.

The city of Morehead in Rowan County, Ky. was named in his honor.





Gov. Charles Slaughter Morehead was born in 1802. He lived at 156 S. Summer Street, Russellville, Ky. when he was attending Russellville Schools. He moved here from Nelson County, Ky. with his family when he was small. Charles Slaughter Morehead was a first cousin of Gov. James Turner Morehead, as their fathers were brothers.

Charles Slaughter Morehead was elected to the Kentucky House of Representatives in 1828 and was a state Attorney General from 1830 to 1835. He was again a state representative from 1838 to 1842 and 1844. Three times he was elected Speaker. In 1847, Charles Slaughter Morehead was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. After that term, he returned to Kentucky and was elected governor serving from 1855 through 1859. During his administration, the comprehensive geological survey of Kentucky was completed, a state fair was chartered (1856) to encourage improvements in agriculture, and several progressive steps in education and transportation were noted.

During the Civil War, he first favored neutrality but later favored the South. Once he was arrested for disloyalty and was imprisoned for four months. He lived outside the county for the duration of the war.

Charles Slaughter Morehead died in Mississippi at his plantation in 1863.

Old Logan County Jail

The old Logan County Jail, 278 West 4th Street, Russellville, Ky., is on the same city block as the 1904 historic Logan County Courthouse. Cut stone was salvaged from the previous jail that stood two blocks east, and was used to construct the cell section circa 1880. Living quarters for the jailer and his family were added with a porch extending across the front.

A century later, the Logan County Genealogical Society was formed and a group of volunteers began to organize and index old court records. This important work was recognized by the county government, and the old jail was restored and designated as housing for the society and the preservation of significant archival materials. Researchers of genealogy and general history find these accessible resources invaluable.

In 1980, Logan County Judge-Executive Bob Brown ordered the preservation of the old jail when it was no longer to be used to house criminals. Steel shelving was added to all available floor space in the vault and some to the living areas of the jail building. Old records were preserved in the fireproof vault with humidity and temperature controls. Work areas are used in the front of the jail building which had been the housing for the jailers and their families.

Since the 1980s, the fiscal court has financed a new roof, major work



on the deteriorating brickwork with new point and tuck work, and the electrical system has been updated. Windows have been restored by an authority on the restoration of old buildings and a new door was donated by the conservatory. Windows were financed through donations, both individuals, and groups.

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Kentucky Governor John Jordan Crittenden

The home of Gov. John Jordan Crittenden is located at 113 W. 9th and S. Main Streets, Russellville, Ky. Crittenden moved to Russellville from Woodford County around 1807 and lived in this house. Here he studied law under Judge George M. Bibb and began his distinguished career and political service.


Gov. Crittenden is the son of Major John Crittenden, a Revolutionary War officer, and his wife, Judith Harris. His father had surveyed land in Kentucky with George Rogers Clark and settled there just after the end of the American Revolution.

Gov. Crittenden was the best educated of the early Kentucky governors. He attended Washington College (later Washington and Lee) and graduated from William and Mary. After studying law with Judge George M. Bibb, he began a practice in Russellville, Ky.

In 1809, Gov. Crittenden was appointed attorney for the Illinois territory and aid de camp to Governor Ninian Edwards. During the war of 1812, he served as an aid to General Samuel Hopkins and Gov. Isaac Shelby. In 1811, Crittenden was elected to the state House of Representatives for the first of six consecutive terms, serving as Speaker for three years. In 1817, The General Assembly elected him to a vacancy in the U.S. Senate where he promoted the interests of the underprivileged. In 1819, he moved to Frankfort, Ky. to enlarge his law practice. He won a special election to the state House in 1829 and served three terms. His law practice flourished, and he became famous for his defenses in murder trials and his oratory.

Gov. Crittenden became Kentucky Secretary of State in 1834. In 1835, he was elected to the U.S. Senate, reelected in 1840, but resigned to become President William H. Harrison's Attorney General. In 1848, he won the race for governor in Kentucky, serving until 1850 when he became Attorney General in President Millard Fillmore's cabinet. In 1854, he was elected to the U.S. Senate for a fourth time.

In 1860, Senator Crittenden introduced into the Senate a set of compromise proposals that he hoped would alleviate



sectional conflict (in the United States). Referred to as the Crittenden Compromise, the proposals sought to relieve concerns over the slavery issue in the north and south and reflected the senator's desire to preserve the union. In a very close vote 25 to 23 the proposal was defeated by the Senate, ending any hope of settlement short of war.

Gov. Crittenden had two sons that fought in the Civil War. Thomas fought for the Union and George fought for the Confederacy. They met in the battle of Shiloh, but both lived to return home.

Gov. Crittenden died in Frankfort in 1863. Crittenden County, Ky. is named for Gov. Crittenden.





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Reverend John Littlejohn

A large part of America's religious history was written in Logan County, Ky. One chapter of this history includes John Littlejohn, an outstanding pioneer Methodist preacher who lived his last 14 years in Logan County and is buried in the cemetery on the corner of 2nd and Caldwell Streets in Russellville, Ky.

Although Reverend Littlejohn traveled as a rugged circuit rider, he is spoken of as one of the most eloquent men in the American pulpit. Church historians write that few men have ranked with John Littlejohn.

Besides being a giant among preachers, he was a saddlemaker by trade and discharged various and important duties of civil nature. During the War of 1812, he was serving as sheriff and justice of Loudoun County, Va. When the British burned Washington, the national archives were transported by wagons to Leesburg for safekeeping. President James Madison turned the keys and complete custody over to Reverend Littlejohn. For more than two weeks he was responsible for such items as the Declaration of Independence.

Born in England on Dec. 7, 1756, Reverend Littlejohn was educated in English public schools. He came to America in 1766 and lived at Port Tobacco, Maryland where he was apprenticed as a mechanic and also served as a clerk, or assistant shopkeeper. In 1773 he was converted and became a traveling minister. In 1818 Rev. Littlejohn left Virginia and came to Louisville, Ky. In 1821 he bought a farm at Red River in Logan County. He lived here until his death in 1836.




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
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Lieutenant Presley N. O'Bannon House

Lt. Presley O'Bannon was a first lieutenant in the United States Marine Corps, famous for his exploits in the First Barbary War (1801-1805). In recognition of his bravery, he was presented a sword for his part in attempting to restore Prince Hamet Karamanli to his throne as the Bey of Tripoli. This sword became the model for the Mameluke Sword, adopted in 1825 for Marine Corps officers, which is part of the formal uniform today.

Lt. O'Bannon moved to Russellville, Ky. after he resigned from the Marine Corps on March 6, 1807. He built a home in 1812 at the corner of 9th and Main Streets. The home is now a museum opened by U.S. Marine Corps Major General Jerry Humble (Retired).

O'Bannon was born in Fauquier County, Va., to William O'Bannon, a captain of the Continental Army in the American Revolutinary War (1775-1783), and Anne Neville.

O'Bannon entered the Marine Corps on Jan. 18, 1801. As a first lieutenant assigned to USS Argus, he commanded a detachment of seven Marines and two Navy midshipmen in diplomatic Consul General William Eaton's (1764–1811) small army during the Tripoli campaign of the First Barbary War (1801-1805). In the combined operations with the U.S. Navy, he led the successful attack at the Battle of Derna, a coastal town in eastern modern Libya on April 27, 1805, giving the Marine's Hymn its line "to the shores of Tripoli." Lieutenant O'Bannon became the first man to raise a United States flag over foreign soil in time of war.

O'Bannon served in the Kentucky State Legislature in 1812, 1817, and 1820-21, and in the Kentucky State Senate from 1824 to 1826. He died in 1850.



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South Union today is more than just a memory, it is a place to visit and learn firsthand about the Shaker way of life. Several of the original buildings have been restored and now house a fine museum of Shaker folklife, material culture, and unique gift shop. South Union Shaker Village is located at 854 Shaker Museum Road, Auburn, KY

Cedar Grove School

The Cedar Grove Rosenwald one-room schoolhouse on Watermelon Road, in Olmstead was built in 1929 and was used until 1949. It is still in the original location and is available for tours upon request.

Total cost for the original school was \$2,100. It was a one teacher facility with 12-15 students on the average. It was heated with a wood stove.

It includes Bungalow/craftsman architecture. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2002.

It is a one-story 30 feet (9.1 m) by 32 feet (9.8 m) balloon-framed building, funded by the Julius Rosenwald Fund. It served as a schoolhouse until it was acquired by the Cedar Grove Missionary Baptist Church.





When industry was composed of rope factories, blacksmithing and wagon works, Russellville was listed as the third most important industrial city in Kentucky. The Caldwell Saddle Factory, located on East 4th Street, is believed to be the oldest original factory building still standing in the state. In the attic of the building, slave writings can be seen on the ceiling.

Jackson-Dickinson Duel

Before Andrew Jackson became the 7th President of the United States in 1829, he killed Charles Dickinson in a duel near Adairville, Ky. on May 30, 1806.

According to Kentucky History, Dickinson, an attorney from Nashville, Tenn., and Andrew Jackson engaged in a duel on the Jeff Burr farm. The quarrel between the two men began as comments were made by Dickinson about Jackson's wife, Rachel. Part of the argument also related to Dickinson accusing Jackson of cheating on a horse bet. Rachel's first husband, Lewis Robards, petitioned for a divorce, accusing Rachel of desertion and living in sin with Jackson. Robards failed to finalize their divorce, but Rachel and Jackson, believing the divorce to be finalized, eloped in 1791. Rachel and Robards divorce was not finalized until September 1793, and Jackson and Rachel remarried in 1794.

After the insult to Rachel and a public statement in which Dickinson called Jackson



a worthless scoundrel and coward, Jackson challenged Dickinson to a duel. On May 30, the two men met at Harrison's Mills. Dickinson's first bullet hit Jackson in the chest. Jackson's first shot misfired and, according to the code duello, he should not have been able to refire. Re-cocking his gun, Jackson fired and killed his opponent. Although Jackson's wound was not fatal, he suffered chronic pain from the wound for the remainder of his life.

Jackson was not prosecuted for murder. The duel had little effect on his successful presidential campaign in 1829. Dickinson is buried at Old City Cemetery in Nashville, Tenn.



AFRICAN AMERICAN

ARCHIVE AND RESEARCHCENTER

The West Kentucky African-American Heritage Center includes a research facility, which is home to an extensive collection of local papers and documents which attracts researchers from around the US. It is within walking distance of four museum buildings in the Black Bottom District.

SEEK Museum

Russellville may be one of the best places in Kentucky to tell the stories of African-American heritage.

The SEEK Museum (which is an acronym for Struggles for Emancipation and Equality in Kentucky) has been developing historic sites and programming for over a decade now. However, this is only part of the story.

Logan County had the second-largest number of freed slaves in 1860 (behind only Jefferson County), and the lengthy list of emancipations are spread throughout the county record books.

The most notable emancipator was Revolutionary War Major Richard Bibb, whose home is a public museum in Russellville. Bibb's involvement in the Kentucky Colonization Society led him to send several of his freed slaves to Liberia in the 1830s and many others settled into areas known as Upper Bibbtown and Lower Bibbtown.

The Black Bottom National Register of Historic District has just been approved by the Federal government and boasts hundreds of historic buildings that were constructed after the Civil War. Included in the Black Bottom Historic District are six buildings that have been restored by his Historic Russellville, Inc. for use as the West Kentucky African-American Heritage Center.

The current exhibit features Alice Allison Dunnigan (a Civil Rights pioneer and the first black female reporter in the White House Foreign Press Corps.); the 1908 lynching of four innocent men from an oak tree; segregated schools; African-American soldiers in the Civil War; and former Russellville resident and blues singer, Mary Ann Fisher, Ray Charles' first female vocalist.

These exhibits are displayed in a group of historic homes including the oldest brick building (1810) still standing in Russellville, post-Civil War homes built by men who had fought for their freedom as Union soldiers, to a 1940 shotgun house.

In addition to the exhibits, ongoing research activities focused on the genealogy of African-Americans in Kentucky and an extensive collection of African-American artifacts are being cataloged and archived.

Cultural heritage programming included an outdoor blues concert honoring Mary Ann Fisher, along with other musical performances in the restored KP Hall, part of the "chitlin circuit" of the Jim Crow years. A summer youth program, Roots Revisited, focused on heritage education and character development.



Bibb House

In the 1820s it was the townhouse of Revolutionary War Major Richard Bibb who freed 29 of his slaves in 1829 and paid for their passage to Liberia and who then provided for the liberation of his remaining slaves by his will at his death in 1839.

The Palladian-style home is an excellent example of the fine, early architecture of Kentucky.

It demonstrates the lifestyle and customs of the landed gentry who migrated to Kentucky and will also tell the stories of the enslaved African-Americans, many of whom obtained their freedom at the site.

The most important focus of this museum is its developing educational programs for children throughout the region. Unlike many house museums that only showcase a "way of life," a significant historical event took place on the Bibb House grounds.



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













Cooksey House

The Cooksey House was the home of Solomon Cooksey and his family for many years. Caroline Cooksey and her six children, Maranda Elizabeth, James, Eliza, Harriett, Mary Jane, and Solomon were set free in the will of Dorcas Cooksey on May 27, 1850. Solomon who was born in 1835 in Logan County, Kentucky would buy this land in the 1880s. And after his death, it was the home of his son Charles Cooksey who was a teacher in the colored schools of Logan County for over 40 years. The Cooksey family would own this land for 70 years.




The Payne Dunnigan house was the home of the late Ruby Brown Payne. Her sister-in-law was the late Alice Allison Dunnigan, noted newspaper reporter, author, and Civil Rights leader. These unique houses in Russellville are called the Black Bottom.

The Black Bottom has been a neighborhood for over 150 years. In its heyday, it had five churches, four restaurants, three grocery stores, a funeral home, a doctor, and a dentist.

The West Kentucky African-American Museum and Research Center welcomes you to come take a walk in the history of African-Americans from Western Kentucky.

Kimbrough House

The Kimbrough House is the oldest brick house standing in Russellville. It was built between 1810 and 1815. It was the home of the Morton and Caldwell families of Logan County. In later years, it was the home of the Rev. Roy Hughes, an African-American preacher. He would bring the first African-American Boy Scout troop to Logan County. Rev. Hughes married over 50 people in this house between 1945 and 1968. The last owner of this house was Alex Kimbrough. In 1968, he was the first African-American to serve on a trial jury. After his death, the home was purchased by Historic Russellville, Inc.





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Alice Allison Dunnigan

The 33rd annual Emancipation Celebration was extra special because the statue of Alice Allison Dunnigan was officially unvieled to the public. The statue was uncovered by members of the Dunnigan and Allison families as dozens in attendance watched. Prior to the unveiling ceremony, members of the Dunnigan's family and others spoke to the audience about her life and times.

The statue now stands on the grounds of SEEK Museum: Struggles for Emancipation and Equality in Kentucky on the corner of East 6th and South Morgan streets as part of a new park area dedicated to civil rights.

This 2019 festival theme was "Alice Is Coming Home" in honor of the statue celebration.

Dunnigan was born in Russellville in 1906, the daughter of a tenant farmer and a laundress. After graduating from **30** LOGAN COUNTY VISITOR GUIDE 2023-24

the segregated Knob City High School in Russellville, she completed a teacher's course at what is now known as Kentucky State University and began an 18-year career as a teacher in Logan and Todd counties. During World War II, Dunnigan moved to Washington, D.C., and began working for the Associated Negro Press. She became head of its Washington Bureau on Jan 1, 1947. In August of that year, after she had successfully lobbied for a change in the rules of the U.S. Senate to allow African American journalists to attend presidential press conferences, Dunnigan began her career reporting on all branches of the federal government.

In 1948 Dunnigan again made history by being the first African American woman to travel with and report on a Presidential tour when she went on the whistle-stop tour with President Truman. She personally paid the expenses for this trip after her boss told her "Women don't make trips like that." Her statue has been on its own whistle-stop tour, having been displayed at the Newseum in Washington, D.C., the University of Kentucky, the Truman Presidential Library and Museum, and Kentucky State University. The statue was created by Amanda Matthews and Brad Connell, owners of Prometheus Art of Lexington, Kentucky.

Dunnigan received more than 50 awards during her lifetime and has been inducted into the Kentucky Halls of Fame for Civil Rights, Journalism and Writers, and the Hall of Fame for the National Association of Black Journalists. She authored two books: "A Black Woman's Experience from the School House to the White House" and "The Fascinating Story of Black Kentuckians: Their Heritage and Traditions."

Russellville Walking Tour

Welcome to Russellville, KY, the county seat of Logan County. Known as "Rogues' Harbor" and "Big Boiling Spring" to the early settlers, it has held the name of Russellville since 1798 in honor of Revolutionary War General William Russell.


The majority of the early settlers came from Virginia and North Carolina. As one of Kentucky's oldest counties, Logan's long and colorful history includes four Kentucky governors, famous and infamous heroes and a legacy of historic sites and events.

It is where the Second Great Awakening of 1800 began, where the Confederate Government of Kentucky was organized, where Andrew Jackson fought a duel and where the most southwestern Shaker community was established. Today, a balance of agriculture, industry and opportunities for education and recreation make it a desirable place to live.

Sources of additional information may be found in the Logan County Archives, the Public Library, and Logan County Tourism Center. We hope you enjoy your visit.

WALKING TOUR ROUTE

- 1. Public Square: Site of two courthouses from 1801-1904. An earlier courthouse was a cedar log building in east Russellville where Andrew Jackson appeared in 1794. The Square today contains several historical markers, a Confederate memorial, a cast iron fountain and military memorials including a cannon.
- 2. The Harrison-Hite Building: Ca. 1887. Carter Harrison (who built a number of the downtown buildings) and his son operated a casket factory, a grocery and a furniture store in this building. In the mid 1920s, W.T. Hite purchased the building and converted it to Russellville's first gasoline station. It now houses the Logan County Chamber of Commerce and the office of Logan Economic Alliance for Development (LEAD).
- **3. Russellville City Hall:** Ca. 1887. These buildings have been extensively remodeled and have housed various business including a dry cleaning establishment.
- 4. The News Democrat & Leader Building: Ca. 1873. The News-



Democrat & Leader is successor to The Mirror, western Kentucky's oldest newspaper, established in 1806. The building was formerly home to the newspaper as well as a hardware store that had several owners.

- 5. Convention House of the Confederacy: Also known as the Clark Building, the center section of this building was constructed ca. 1820 by an Englishman named Forst. It was the site of the Confederate Convention held in November, 1861. Delegates from forty-three Kentucky counties met to form a provisional government for the Confederate State of Kentucky. The building now houses the law offices of the great-grandson of the "keeper of the door" during that convention.
- 6. Logan County Courthouse: Ca. 1904. This is Logan County's fourth courthouse. On top is a reproduction of the first weathervane originally on the courthouse located in the Public Square. The original fish

has three bullet holes, allegedly shot by either a member of the James Gang or a drunken Union soldier during the Civil War. Many of the offices moved one block west upon the completion of the Logan County Justice Center in 2010.

7. The Old Jail: Ca. 1869. Notable for

the cut stone cell block salvaged from the previous jail at Fourth and Summer, the Old Jail houses county records and archives under the auspices of the Genealogical Society.

- 8. The Old Armory: Ca. 1930. Built by the Works Progress Administration (WPA), the Tom Rhea Armory was the home of Company M National Guard that was active during WWII. It now houses the city parks and recreation department.
- 9. Sacred Heart Catholic Church: Ca. 1963. Notable are the stained glass windows added in 1990 which are the work of Logan County industry Strickler Stained Glass. The original white frame church building, located immediately north of the present church, was built in 1872 with the assistance of L&N Railroad employees during nonworking hours.
- 10. The Presbyterian Church: Ca. 1878. This church was partially funded by the United States Government after an earlier building located on Blakey Street was destroyed by Union soldiers during the Civil War.
- 11. The Sandidge House: Ca. 1894. This was the home of Judge W.P. Sandidge. It is an outstanding example of Queen Anne architecture and at one time was a school of osteopathy.
- 12. de Graffenried Building: Constructed ca. 1967 for Logan County Public Library, it was financed with a combination of federal, state and local matching funds from the Thomas P. deGraffenried legacy to the citizens of Russellville. The library moved to new facilities on Armory Dr. in 2014 and the Senior Citizens Center and Community Action of Southern Ky. Inc are located here.
- 13. First Christian Church: Ca. 1871. This building was extensively remodeled in the early 1900s at which time the stained glass windows were added and the front was moved from east to north. This lot was the original location of the blacksmith shop of Major Richard Bibb
- 14. The Morton-Loving House: Ca. 1810. This fine example of early architecture was the home of both Dr. H.T. Loving and William J. Morton. Morton was a close friend of Governor John Breathitt and conducted the governor's funeral service in 1834.

15. Slaughter-deGraffenried

House: Ca. 1820. Built by Thomas Slaughter, a son-in-law of Major RIchard Bibb, this was the boyhood home of Thomas P. deGraffenried. Mr. deGraffenried was a prominent New York attorney who left Russellville a bequest of one million dollars for the "education of the citizens at large therein." The small building behind the house was used as a private school from 1887 until 1908.

- 16. Bibb House: Ca. 1820. This home was built as a town house by Major Richard Bibb, a Revolutionary War officer, who freed 29 of his slaves in 1829 and paid for their passage to Liberia. Bibb also provided for the liberation of his remaining slaves in his will at this death in 1839. One of Major Bibb's sons, John, developed Bibb lettuce. Another son, George, became Chief Justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court, a U.S. Senator and a member of President Tyler's cabinet. Also known as "The Agnes Davis House," it is currently operated by Historic Russellville.
- 17. Washington House: Ca. 1820. Construction of the original house was begun by John Whiting Washington, a third cousin of George Washington. The house was purchased in 1880 by Thomas Clark.
- 18. Caldwell-Orndorff House: Ca. 1820. This house, which was built by Christopher Orndorff, was later the home of General Samuel Caldwell, who was clerk of the first Logan County Court. General Caldwell died in 1835 and is buried in the backyard. This was the home of Tom Rhea when he ran for governor of Kentucky in 1935. The house was badly damaged by fire in 1988 and rebuilt.
- 19. Crittenden House: Ca. 1810. This unique frame and brick house was the home of John J. Crittenden. He served in the Kentucky House of Representatives, fives terms in the U.S. Senate, as U.S. Attorney General under three presidents and as Governor of Kentucky from 1848 to 1850. He is probably most well remembered as the author of the "Crittenden Compromise" which attempted to prevent the Civil War. Two of his sons fought against each other in the Battle of Shiloh.
- **20.** Wallace-Byrne House: Ca. 1811. Originally a two-room log house built by Judge William Wallace, this building once served as a tavern and stagecoach inn. It was reconstructed in 1822 and again remodeled in the late 1800s. In 1822, the property was acquired by Byrne, whose son was in **32** LOGAN COUNTY VISITOR GUIDE 2023-24

a line of four Doctors Walter Byrne who practiced medicine in Russellville for close to 150 years.

- 21. O'Bannon House: The original section of this house was built Ca. 1811 by Presley N. O'Bannon. O'Bannon launched a political career based on his heroism in the Barbary Wars during which he planted the American flag at Tripoli, the first time the flag was planted on foreign soil. The house was later owned by Richard Bibb Jr., who extensively remodeled it, adding the front section.
- **22.** Courts Hall: Ca. 1890. This Victorian house was built by banker C. Winn Courts. It has five floors and was extensively remodeled in the 1970s by noted journalist Albert P. "Al" Smith.
- 23. Morehead House: Ca. 1820. This was the home of Armistead Morehead, Russellville's first Postmaster and the father of James T. Morehead who served as Kentucky's Lieutenant Governor and became governor in 1834 upon the death of John Breathitt. There is a narrow crawl space tunnel under the street to the Edwards-Atkinson House, believed to be associated with the Underground Railroad.
- **24. Edwards-Atkinson House:** Ca. 1820. Originally built by Major Sherwood Atkinson, the outside circular staircase on the north side, the front porch and Greek Revival columns were added Ca. 1920.
- **25.** The Methodist Temple: Ca. 1854. The church was organized in 1808, the oldest congregation in Russellville. The building was constructed on this site in 1854 and extensively remodeled in 1917 when the columns and stained glass windows were added.
- 26. Browder-Waggener House: Ca. 1850. Built in three stages featuring styles of each period, the interior of this house features of a magnificent stairway. At one time, Bethel College faculty lived here.
- 27. Curd-Coffman House: Ca. 1814. Built by Richard Curd, this house has been owned by the Coffman family since 1865. The Rev. Edward Coffman Sr., a noted local historian and author, wrote "The Story of Logan County" in 1962 and his son, Rev. Edward Coffman Jr., updated and re-titled it "Through My Father's Eyes" in 2002.
- 28. Episcopal Parish House/McCullough Hall: Ca. 1885. This fine example of shingle style architecture was built by J. Cap Morton.

- 29. Trinity Episcopal Church: Ca. 1891. Organized in 1836, it is one of the oldest churches in the Diocese of Kentucky. It is a modest but good example of a post-Civil War Gothic Revival Episcopal Church. The original cast iron fence is one of the many that were once numerous
- **30. First Baptist Church:** Ca. 1899. The Victorian structure replaced an earlier Baptist Church built in 1816. The steeple was added in 2007.

around town.

- 31. Samuel Caldwell House: Ca. 1820. One of several buildings constructed by Col. Thomas Grubbs in early Russellville, this was the home of Gen. Samuel Caldwell who was the town's first merchant and held positions among the earliest governmental leadership. The Grubbs home was two blocks east of this site.
- **32. Andrews House:** Ca. 1810. The wooden exterior of this house, which once sold for \$125 and a mare, resembles cut stone in the style of Mount Vernon.
- 33. Southern Bank of Kentucky: Ca. 1857. Built by George Norton to serve as both a bank and residence, the bank was robbed by the Jesse James Gang in 1868 in their first documented robbery. During the Civil War, over one million dollars in currency was removed from the vault and hidden to avoid confiscation by soldiers.
- **34. Jones House:** Ca. 1810. Home of Walter Jones, Russellville's first doctor, and later owned by the Norton family who built the Southern Bank next door.
- 35. Governor Breathitt House: Ca. 1820. This was the home of John Breathitt, governor of Kentucky from 1832-1834. Governor Breathitt is buried in Logan County and a monument to him was erected by the State of Kentucky in Maple Grove Cemetery. The two-story brick structure to the west was also built by Governor Breathitt as a one-story office. The second floor was added by Carter Harrison in the last quarter of the nineteenth century.
- 36. The Opera House: Ca. 1903. This building was constructed to accommodate traveling shows and operas. The original entrance was in the center of the building with a wide staircase to the second floor which housed a stage, boxes, balcony and dressing rooms. It was later converted to a movie house and a businesses occupied the first floor.

LOGAN COUNTY HISTORICAL MARKERS

"ELMWOOD"

KY 80, near Dennis

This was the last home of Capt. John Lewis, born 1747 in Va., son of Col. Fielding Lewis and Catherine Washington, first cousin of George Washington. Col. Lewis and John supplied Va. troops with gunpowder during Rev. War. In 1811, John and daughter Mary Ann moved to Warren Co. Losing his land to squatters, he came to his sons' home, died in 1825, and was buried here.

ALICE ALLISON DUNNIGAN - 1906-1983

City Park, Russellville

Born near Russellville, Logan Co., the granddaughter of slaves, Alice Dunnigan gained recognition as a journalist and civil rights leader. During an 18-year teaching career, she also wrote for African American newspapers and continued her education. Based in Washington, D.C., in 1940s, she reported on government at the highest levels.

Civil Rights Activist/Author

In 1948, Alice Dunnigan was first black reporter on campaign trail with a president-Truman. Under Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, she was member of President's Committee on Equal Opportunity. Author of: A Black Woman's Experience-From Schoolhouse to White House (1974) and The Fascinating Story of Black Kentuckians: Their Heritage and Traditions (1982).

BETHEL COLLEGE

88 South Bethel St., Russellville

The school began as a Baptist-sponsored high school for boys in 1854 and was chartered as a college in 1856. It closed in 1861 due to the Civil War but reopened two years later. It continued as a four-year college until 1920. From 1921 until closing in 1933, it was a two-year junior college. In 1928 it became co-educational. The sixteen-acre campus had five buildings: main building, the president's home, two dormitories, and library & gymnasium. Also had sixteen small homes for married ministerial students and an athletic field, Brookside Park. Confederate Convention met here, 1861. Campus was later used as a hospital during Civil War. Buildings razed in 1968.

BOWIE, A KENTUCKIAN

Courthouse lawn, US 68, Russellville

James Bowie, Col. of Texas Rangers and co-commander at the Alamo, was native of Logan Co. With 187 others-P. J. Bailey, D. W. Cloud, W. Fountleroy of Logan Co. among them-he chose death rather than surrender. "Remember the Alamo" was battle cry of Texas victory and freedom from Mexico, 1836. The Bowie Knife, famed weapon of frontier days, designed by Bowie.

BOYHOOD HOME, 1793-1802

KY 591, Adairville

The Rev. Peter Cartwright, 1785-1872. A dedicated itinerant Methodist preacher in Kentucky for 22 years. Saved from "sins of his youth" and "licensed to exhort" during the Great Revival of 1800. Ordained 1808. He was Presiding Elder for 50 years and delegate to 13 General Conferences. Moved to Illinois in 1824. Defeated by Abraham Lincoln in race for Congress, 1847.

BRODNAX-CONN HOUSE

3288 Conn Rd., Adairville

H. P. Brodnax born 1769 Dinwiddie Co., Va.; admitted to Ky. Bar 1796; law associate c. 1801 of W. P. Duval, who became 1st territorial gov. of Fla; circuit court judge, Logan Co. 1804-30; built house and resided here c. 1830-39; died in 1857 in Russellville. Acquired by pioneer physician Dr. N. T. Conn in 1854. Placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1992.

CEDAR HOUSE

Bowling Green Rd., Russellville

Site of the seat of justice for all Western Ky., 1793-1798. Logan Co. citizens erected two story, four room house of cedar logs, 1792, for first Logan Co. sheriff, Wesley Maulding. First court was held here, 1793. Also used as inn and tavern where members of court and visitors lodged. Then it was considered to be the most elegant house in the Green River country.

CIVIL WAR SKIRMISH/ FUTURE PRESIDENT

225 Armory Dr., Russellville

On September 30, 1862, 600 Union troops led by Colonel Benjamin Harrison came here and surprised an element of Confederate Colonel John Hunt Morgan's cavalry, led by Captain John Baker Dortch. After a sharp skirmish, in which thirty-five Confederates were reportedly killed and wounded, Morgan's troops retreated. A Future President- Harrison, whose troops were victorious in the skirmish here, was a twenty-nine-year-old Indiana attorney. The Russellville fight was his first engagement; his military career continued throughout the Civil War, including service under Gen. W. T. Sherman in the Atlanta Campaign. In 1889, he became the 23rd president of the United States.

COLONY

Near Jct. US 68 & KY 73, South Union

Organized 1807, as Gasper Society of United Believers in Christ's Second Appearing. Building program started and trade established in textiles, seeds, mill products, and purebred cattle. Peak membership 350; acreage 6,000. Most prosperous period 1840-60. Last western colony to disband, 1922. Museum moved here, in 1972, with handicrafts and furniture of the Shakers

CONFEDERATE STATE CONVENTION

US 68, 431, Russellville

Here November 20, 1861, Confederate leaders from 64 Kentucky counties seceded from the Union. The state was admitted as the 13th into the Confederate States of America Dec. 10, 1861.

COUNTY NAMED, 1792

Courthouse lawn, US 68, Russellville

For Gen. Benjamin Logan (1743-1802), pioneer and Indian fighter who called the Danville Assembly, 1784, leading to ten conventions preceding Kentucky's separation from Virginia, 1792. Logan served as a delegate in all ten, later in the legislature. Logan County was formed from part

of Lincoln County, and organized immediately after Ky. admitted to the Union.

DROMGOOLE'S STATION

First St., Adairville

Site of station, built 1788, one of several erected in this area. James Dromgoole came from Tenn. with Philip Alston, whose daughter he had married, and settled at Alston's Station, on the Red River, about 1785. After three years he established his own station here on the Nashville to Russellville route. Dromgoole Station's name changed to Adairville, Nov. 1818.

GASPER RIVER MEETING HOUSE

Jct. of US 68, & KY 73

One of three churches of Reverend James McGready, a Presbyterian minister, in Logan County-Gasper River, Muddy River, and Red River-around which the great frontier revival of 1797 to 1805 began.

GOVERNOR'S CORNER

113 W. 9th St., Russellville

John J. Crittenden, 1787-1863, lived here, 1811-18. War of 1812, State Legislator, 15th Kentucky Governor. U.S. Atty. Gen. under three Presidents. Five times U.S. Senator. Noted for Crittenden Compromise, 1860, futile effort to avert Civil War and preserve the Union. His last words: "Let all the ends thou aimest at be thy country's, thy God's and truth's."

GOVERNOR'S CORNER

145 E. 5th St., Russellville

Home of Governor John Breathitt, born 1787, Virginia. Came here, 1800. Lawyer, legislator. Elected Lieut. Governor, 1828, and Governor, 1832. He was advocate of need for preserving Kentucky's valuable documents. He wrote: "There is a laudable solicitude to know everything in respect to our history." Breathitt died in office, 1834. Monument in Maple Grove Cemetery by Kentucky.

GOVERNORS FROM LOGAN

Courthouse lawn, US 68, Russellville

Seven residents of Logan County became governors in four states:

JACKSON-DICKINSON DUEL

Town Square, US 431, Adairville

On the Jeff Burr farm in second "Poplar Bottom" is the site of the duel fought May 30, 1806. Andrew Jackson was wounded. Half mile west of site is Will Tyler farm where Charles Dickinson died. Miller's "Buttermilk Spring" is south on highway 75 two miles, on Old Burr farm.

JOHN LITTLEJOHN

Town Square, US 68, Russellville

Born Eng., 1756, came America, 1767. Became Methodist preacher at age 20, riding the circuits in Md., Va., Ky. Came to Louisville from Leesburg, Va., 1818. Moved Warren Co., Ky., and then 7 miles south of Russellville in 1822. Died in 1836 after 60 years as minister. His priceless journals (1772-1832) are preserved by the Methodist Church. Guardian of the Declaration of Independence, other state papers, which were entrusted to him by President James Madison in War of 1812. As the British advanced on Washington, Aug. 1814, the President ordered the national archives loaded onto a wagon and sent about 35 miles to Littlejohn, Methodist preacher, Leesburg, and sheriff, Loudoun Co., Va.

JOHN LITTLEJOHN CEMETERY

Second & Caldwell Sts., Russellville

Burial place of John Littlejohn, esteemed Methodist preacher. He came to Russellville in 1822 and conducted camp meetings, services, & ministered throughout Logan Co. While he was a sheriff in Virginia, during the War of 1812, he was entrusted by Pres. James Madison to protect the National Archives. Land given by Marmaduke Beckwith Morton VIII. Burial site of persons who died during the 1835 cholera epidemic. Many buried without any markers. Several founding fathers of Russellville buried here. Their slaves were buried on the north end of the cemetery; those graves were marked with fieldstones.

LEWIS AND CLARK IN KENTUCKY — WILLIAM CLARK'S 1809 VISIT & DEATH OF MERIWETHER LEWIS

US 68 & KY 80, Russellville

William Clark, coleader of the famous Lewis & Clark Expedition, visited Russellville with his family October 3-7, 1809, while traveling to Louisville and farther east. Benjamin & Eleanor Clark Temple, Clark's niece, lived in Russellville. On Oct. 21, 1809, Russellville Farmer's Friend newspaper ran one of the first reports of the death of Meriwether Lewis, coleader of the Expedition. Taken from a Tenn. paper, it detailed his suicide at an inn on the Natchez Trace.

LOGAN COUNTY JAIL, 1874-1977

W. Fourth St., Russellville

This building replaced an old jail three blocks east which burned. To finance construction of new jail, a property tax was passed, 1869. By December 1874, jail operated on this site. Jail restored, 1979-1980. County records stored here by order of Fiscal Court. Logan County Genealogical Society designated to clean and file the records.

MAULDING'S FORT

KY 663, 10 mi. S. of Russellville

Site of stockade, built in 1780 on the Red River as protection against Indians. Named for the James Maulding family, immigrants from Virginia and leaders in Russellville's early development. Morton Maulding was the first representative of Logan County to Kentucky legislature, 1794. In 1782, Indians compelled a temporary abandonment of fort.

MCCUTCHEN MEADOWS

12345 Bowling Green Rd., Auburn

Earliest land grant to property is dated 1798 and signed by **34** LOGAN COUNTY VISITOR GUIDE 2023-24

James Garrard, 2nd gov. of Ky. Issued to Elizabeth, widow of John McCutchen. Built by 1825, mansion originally had four rooms and wide central hall upstairs and down, with rear wing. Family owned home some 150 years. Burial ground on property. On National Reg. of Hist. Places.

O'BANNON HOUSE

S. Main St., site of house, Russellville,

Lt. Presley N. O'Bannon, USMC, the first American to raise our flag on foreign soil, April 17, 1805. Barbary coast pirates who were holding 180 American seamen for ransom were overcome in an attack led by O'Bannon. He came to Logan County in 1807. Served in state legislature 1812, 17, 20-21, and Senate 1824-26. Died in 1850. His remains moved to Frankfort, 1920.

OLD BANK, ROBBED 1868

South Main & 6th St., Russellville

Part of building erected about 1810 by Wm. Harrison, used as a residence by him and later by the Nortons. In 1857 front part built for Southern Bank of Ky. Building owned by Judge Hardy family sixty yrs. (1966). Mar. 20, 1868, it was scene of holdup by notorious Jesse James gang, who escaped with over \$9,000 after they shot, slightly wounded bank president, N. Long.

ORIGIN OF FEDERAL HIGHWAY U.S. 79

Intersection of U.S. 79 North and U.S. 68 East, Russellville, KY

Origin of Federal Highway U.S. 79 - U.S. 79 begins in Russellville and runs 865 miles to Austin, TX. It was approved in 1837 by the Kentucky legislature & was needed for commerce and trade between Kentucky, Tennessee, and later Texas. U.S. 79 played a key role in early development of Western Kentucky. It joined the Fed. Hwy system via the Hwy. Act of 1935.

RED RIVER MEETING HOUSE

US 431, 10 mi. S. of Russellville

Three miles east is site of early pioneer church. Organized by "A Society of Presbyterians" in 1789. Here The Great Revival of 1800 was conducted by Reverend James McGready. First Camp Meeting held here.

REV. VALENTINE COOK (1763-1822)

Jct. KY 1588 & John Rob Williams Rd., 4 mi. NE of Russellville

Pioneer Methodist preacher who settled on Muddy River in 1806 where Camp Meeting was held, 1800. A teacher, orator and organizer of churches, he attended Cokesbury College in Md. and began ministry, 1788. Presiding Elder of Cumberland Dist., 1798. Married Tabitha, niece of Gov. Slaughter, same year. Buried near Camp Meeting site.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR WIDOW

KY 100, 2 mi. SE of Russellville

Abigail, wife of General Daniel Morgan, died in 1816 and was buried in family cemetery ½ mile south. Her husband, one of Washington's chief strategists during the Amer. Revolution, campaigned from Boston and Quebec, 1775, to the Carolinas, 1781. After Morgan's death and burial in Va., 1802, Mrs. Morgan came here and lived in this area about 10 years.

RHEA STADIUM

Ninth and Summer Streets (Lower Entrance to Stadium), Russellville, KY

Rhea Stadium was named for Thomas S. Rhea, a local &

state political figure. It was a project of the Works Progress Administration, a New Deal program started under Franklin D. Roosevelt. The first game was played on Nov. 23, 1939. Dedication of the stadium occurred on Sept. 20, 1940. Added to Nat'l Register of Historic Places 2008.

SHAKER COLONY

US 68, near Warren Co. line

Organized in 1807 as the Gasper Society of United Believers in Christ's Second Appearing. Last western colony to disband, 1922. Enrollment reached 349; acreage, 6000. Noted for silk and woolen cloth, furniture, tools, seeds, preserves and purebred stock.

SHAKER MUSEUM

US 68. Auburn

Handicrafts, furniture, books, and inspirational drawings of the Shakers, 1807 to 1922. It is located on land that formerly was Shakers' sugar maple farm, a part of 6000 acre holdings. Headquarters of colony at South Union. Top enrollment was 349

THE SHAKER TAVERN

KY 73, South Union

Built 1869, nine years after the completion of the Louisville and Nashville railroad thru South Union land. Members approved tax to build line thru here, furnished material and constructed depot. Visitors increased and trustees built the hotel, replacing use of frame office building, center of village. One outside chimney for three fireplaces, unique feature.

TOWN HOUSE OF MAJ. RICHARD BIBB

Eighth & Winter Sts., Russellville

Bibb, a Revolutionary War soldier, was born in Va. in 1752. He came to Lexington, Kentucky, in 1798; moved to Logan Co. the next year where he built Bibb's Chapel. Later, erected this house for his wife. Maj. Bibb freed 29 of his slaves in 1829 and sent them to Liberia. He died in 1839, and his will provided for the release of his other slaves and gave them land.

UNITED METHODIST TEMPLE

395 S. Main St., Russellville

Began 1808 as Methodist Society in home of Mr. and Mrs. Josiah Emmit with ten charter members. Bibb, Caldwell, Morton, and Barclay among first families. Early minister H. H. Kavanaugh became a noted bishop. First church was built ca. 1819 at site of Russellville Middle School. Present church completed, 1854; A.M.E. Zion Church formed, 1872. The temple was remodeled in 1917. Church became known as a temple after a news story praised its windows during 1917 renovation. Its first pipe organ was provided by matching funds from Andrew Carnegie. Here, on Christian Heritage Day 1965, Logan Countians honored the memory of John Littlejohn and other circuit riders of all faiths.

YOUNG MEMORIAL PARK

US 79, 7 mi. S. of Russellville

Honoring Paul Everett Young, Sr., in recognition of his dedication to roadside beauty and conservation. Directed his interest, energy, and influence toward development of these parks. Logan County native, 1904-1966. Served this 20th District in Kentucky House of Representatives 12 years, 1954-1966. Lawmaker, county official, banker, farmer.



Russellville Walking Tour

In 2017, the Logan County Public Library celebrated its 50th anniversary. Many things have changed over the years—the card catalog cabinets and the due date cards in the front pocket of the book have been replaced by computers and specialized software. The large section of reference works where research was conducted has largely been replaced by subscriptions to online resources that provide needed information.

However, the most important thing has remained exactly the same—trained, professional staff who are there to provide for the informational and entertainment needs of their community. The methods may differ, but the purpose is a constant.

The main library, located at 225 Armory Drive in Russellville, is open 62 hours each week, seven days a week. The branch libraries, located in Adairville and Auburn, are open less total hours, but provide similar services—material checkout (books, audiobooks, DVDs, etc.); computer use and wireless access; weekly story times; copy, fax, and notary service; and much, much more.



Programming has always been a staple for the library. Over the years the library has expanded to offer hundreds of programs for children, teens, and adults. Several programs are now hosted at our branches and community centers across the county. To give patrons and the community an extraordinary experience, the library will occasionally bring in performers and exhibits to enhance the time spent at the library. Through programming we hope to encourage patrons to become lifelong library users and supporters.

Often groups in the community need a place to meet, whether it's the regular monthly meeting of a history club, a business needing training space, or former classmates meeting up to plan a class reunion. The library offers two meeting spaces-free of chargeto qualifying groups in the county. These meeting rooms, along with the comfortable seating areas in the main library, are just one more way the library serves as a community hub, allowing citizens to gather and exchange ideas and information.

While the library may look very different from the one that first opened its doors in 1967, its purpose is, as always, to be a valuable resource for Logan County and beyond. For more information, please visit www.loganlibrary.org or stop by a library location.

Lake Mahone

Lake Malone is a 788-acre reservoir lake created in 1961. It is named for Mr. and Mrs. Wallace C. Malone, who donated land for the lake. Logan, Todd and Muhlenberg counties all border the lake with Logan having approximately 330 property owners on the lake. Lake Malone captures Kentucky's beauty in a small package. The lake is enclosed by dramatic 50-foot sandstone bluffs rising above the water's edge and surrounded by hardwood forests. The park has a campground, marina, beach and hiking trail.

Camping: Over 100 primitive sites are available for tent camping. 25 campsites are equipped with electric and water hookups to accommodate recreational vehicles. A central service building offers showers, rest rooms and a laundry. Campsites have grills and picnic tables. Reservations can be made online or at

1-888-4KY-PARK.

Fishing: Variety of species such as channel catfish, large-mouth bass, crappie, bluegill and readear sunfish. A boat ramp is available at the lake.

Beach: Sand beach with boathouse, showers, restrooms and a vending area.

Hiking trails: Easy-rated 1.5-mile hiking trail provides views of many rock walls, once used as shelters by pre-historic Native Americans.

Picnicking and playground: Two picnic shelters with restrooms, picnic tables, grills and an adjacent playground.

The Big Twigs family: Three 14-foot sculptures can be viewed by taking a short hike around beautiful Lake Malone State Park. Maps are posted.

Red River

Red River is where many locals have spent summers kayaking, canoeing, fishing, and camping in Logan

Flower Farms


